


Alström Syndrome UK

Strength for today, hope for the future


Review of the year 2016-17

- 69 out of 71 families received personalised family support from the ASUK team
- A total of 67 people attended 10 AS specialised clinics



- 100% of families who completed evaluation forms told us they were 'happy' or 'very happy' with the AS clinics and ASUK Support Services
- 4 young people were supported in their preparation to move onto adult services
- 15 people took part in the first AS clinical trial in the UK
- 37 children joined in a Children in Need funded project; where 22 families took part in fun activities such as zip wiring and driving experiences and 17 families enjoyed 'Foodie Fun Friends' clubs




33 children have Alström Syndrome

Advancing Diagnosis, Care, Treatment and Support for those living with Alström Syndrome in the UK

- There are 7 Trustees on the Board of ASUK
- 7 people work for ASUK, supporting families, promoting research and raising awareness
- 7 grants have been given to families
- 12 exercise equipment or gym/ swimming membership has been provided by ASUK
- The website had 29,870 new visitors and was viewed 61,388 times
