STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing Document

The organisation is a charitable company, limited by guarantee, incorporated on 1st May 1998 and registered as a charity in the UK on 25th August 1998. The company was established under a memorandum of association which established the objectives and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its articles of association.

Recruitment and appointment of trustees

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law.

New trustees are appointed by the existing trustees and serve for three years after which they put themselves forward for re-appointment. Trustees can serve a maximum of three terms of three years, a total of nine years at which point they must resign from the board. They can serve on an ASUK patient advisory or project group after this.

Induction and training of trustees

New trustees are given a copy of the memorandum and articles of association and are given copies of the Charity Commission guidance "The Essential Trustee: What you need to know"

New trustees have a six-month induction period during which they can be assigned a trustee mentor who can provide advice and guidance. New Trustees receive an induction pack containing key information to gain a further understanding of ASUK and its' strategic priorities. They are invited to meet with the Chief Executive and the staff team as well as patients and their families.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Public benefit

The trustees have complied with section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 in regard to the public benefit requirement. During the year, we have:

- Represented patient's views by campaigning and lobbying government working collaboratively
 with other rare disease patient groups and organisations. ASUK joined over 125 patient
 organisations signing the Rare Disease UK's open letter, asking the Government to review and
 refresh the UK Strategy for Rare Diseases. This coincided with Rare Disease Day and was
 sent to Baroness Nicola Blackwood, the Minister in charge of rare diseases.
- 2. We continue to work with others to hold the government to account against its' 3 rare disease care promises; Every person with a rare disease will have a dedicated person responsible for coordinating their care. Every patient with a rare disease will be given an 'alert card', including information about their condition, treatment regime and contact details for the individual expert involved in their care. Every child with a rare condition will be transferred to appropriate adult services when they reach the age of 18, even if that adult service is not the commissioning responsibility of NHS England.

- 3. Our Family Support team has continued to provide advice and information to patients and their families at specialist NHS clinics, visited patients and families at home and in schools, colleges and Universities helping with practical challenges. In addition, we have encouraged and supported self-advocacy to enable families to navigate the complex health, social care and education system. We advocate for those who struggle to represent themselves whether through barriers such as language, culture and intellectual disability. The family support team have visited 53 families at home and supported 35 students at school, college or University.
- 4. We achieved 100% attendance with patients attending clinic, a proud achievement and the only patient led organisation to consistently achieve this every year. We supported 60 adults and children, at 11 multidisciplinary clinics.
- 5. The Breaking down Barriers Project has increased its' capacity with rare disease charities increasing its reach and continuing to develop good practice around inclusive approaches. We have employed a Community Coordinator to continue to grow this project. We were invited to speak at the Conservative Muslim Forum (CMF) which brought together expert speakers at the House of Lords to discuss the issues affecting Britain's Muslim communities and to share the experiences of Britain's Jewish communities.
- 6. The board have invested the one in a million fund to lead a major piece of work into the creation of a patient registry.
- 7. We continue to disseminate evidence based information to professionals and others who work with individuals and their families that are affected by Alström Syndrome. Increasing our social media presence and using cost effective ways to disseminate information the website received over 32000 unique visitors during 2018/2019.
- 8. We launched the Big Activity Challenge to fund special activities and experiences to enable and empower adults with Alström. We also provided small grants for fitness related activities and equipment.
- 9. The research consortium developed and designed an Early Years survey to learn more about diagnosis, symptoms and experiences in the under-fives.
- 10. Children and young people have enjoyed theatre visits, flying experiences and learnt cooking skills with the ASUK Food Friends Active Club.
- 11. Trustees attended an away day focussing on the role of a Trustee with Cranfield Trust.
- 12. Trustees and staff enjoyed an away day together discussing achievements and future directions.

Objectives and activities

Purposes and aims

Alström Syndrome UK's objectives, as set out in the company's memorandum of association, are to;

- 1. The relief of sickness of persons with Alström Syndrome in particular but not exclusively by the provision of support, advice and information for such persons their families, carers and those working with affected individuals.
- 2. The promotion of research into Alström Syndrome and related syndromes in the UK and abroad and the public dissemination of the useful results thereof.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Chairs Review

I am pleased to introduce our annual report and accounts for 2018/2019

This is my second Chairs Review and I'm pleased to be able to report on the many achievements in the year against what can only be described as a challenging funding landscape for all charities, particularly for a small organisation that supports patients and families with an ultra-rare disease.

Last year I reported on our recruitment drive, this year I am sad to say that due to unforeseen circumstances two Trustee have resigned. We are grateful to both Rick Steeds and Parminder Jutla-Singh who, in their brief tenure, made an enormous contribution to ASUK. This issue of Trustee recruitment was addressed at a Trustee Training and Development day in March 2019 and we began a new optimistic and enthusiastic recruitment drive in March 2019, paying attention to both targeting potential new Trustees, encouraging the board to suggest candidates and advertising to a wider audience.

The board members in 2018/2019 remain a balanced mix of professionals and individuals with Alström or with a child with Alström syndrome. This continues to enable the board to be a truly representative patient led organisation, serving families and their loved ones.

This year we have made some huge steps forward, focusing on our long-term strategy of increasing research opportunities, continuously improving the support that we offer families and developing robust evidence based resources to inform and educate our many different audiences. The board decided to invest in a long term aim of developing a patient registry and are pleased to be supported by the Centre of Rare Diseases at Sanford University. This is the beginning of a long-term objective that begins to connect patients globally and to this end we have begun conversations with international Alström patient groups to develop 'Global Alström'. During the year, we had four newly diagnosed patients, two adults and two children, a key aim is to identify what are the key factors that lead to a diagnosis.

We continue to support patients and families at clinics. Supporting the transition of younger patients, as they move from children to adult clinics, supporting patients taking part clinical trials and delivered individual family and person centred support throughout the UK. We have been delighted to launch our Big Activity Challenge aimed at adults, funded sports and exercise equipment and organised fun events for families, children and young people, including flying lessons for one adventurous young adult!

Our website and social media presence is expanding with more visitors from all 4 corners of the globe with many of our resources being shared nationally and internationally. I think it can be said it has been an exceptionally busy and successful year!

Financial position

The Trustees are confident that we operate to make effective use of our limited resources. The trustees monitor levels of reserves and planned expenditure closely to ensure that the Charity is managing our limited reserves to the best benefit of the Alström family. The board continues to ensure we operate in a compliant manner.

The trustees are pleased to report small surplus of £9,778 for the year. The General Fund stands at £85,093.

I would personally like to thank the board for their continued commitment, our Chief Executive Ann Chivers and the staff team for their hard work, enthusiasm and dedication to making a difference to the lives of people and their loved ones with Alström Syndrome. I would also like to thank the extraordinary clinicians and professionals who work tirelessly to encourage and support individuals and families.

The work we all do is making a difference, none of which is possible without the generous support of families and friends, supporters and funders, clinicians and professionals. We are extremely grateful to one and all.

Key Achievements and performance

During the year, we have:

- Supported individuals to navigate what can be a complex and difficult social services system to ensure they get the benefits they are entitled to.
- Built upon our knowledge and understanding to further develop a careful and considered transition pathway with young people moving into adult services.
- Continued to provide emotional and practical support for individuals and their families who are experiencing difficulties.
- Made improvements to the service at clinics based on patient feedback.
- Acted prudently and resourcefully to ensure we control expenditure and make the most of income and donations.
- Used social media and other communication channels to increase our reach.
- Enabled peer to peer connections.
- Launched the Big Activity challenge to encourage self-advocacy.

- Encouraged healthy lifestyles with children, young people and adults, providing exercise equipment and gym memberships.
- Developed the Foodie Active Friends Club to include physical activities, aimed at helping children and young people make healthy choices, learn to cook and be active.
- Recruited new staff to begin growing the Breaking Down Barriers project
- Developed collaborative partnerships around key areas of common interest with the intention of working together on projects.
- Successfully bid for Children in Need grant to deliver transition services and fun activities.

Research

Research is one of our main priorities. We have set-up a research consortium to identify and encourage a collaborative approach across all disciplines and are pooling the knowledge and experience of Alström Syndrome and other rare diseases. We have begun a research project into the experiences of children in the early years.

We have continued to engage with the Canadian Pharmaceutical Company Prometic Bio Therapeutics Ltd as the first clinical trial for people affected by Alström Syndrome in the UK moved into phase 2.

We continued working in partnership with Rhythm Pharmaceuticals Inc. to provide practical support for patients with rare diseases, during a new clinical trial

Future Plans

We are ambitious and optimistic about the future. We aim to:

- Increase knowledge and understanding about Alstrom by improving the data we collect and disseminate, through the development and population of a patient registry
- Improve our understanding around diagnosis Map the diagnostic journey and work with international partners to identify key factors and the touch points of diagnosis.
- Work with others to learn and understand more about the Alström Heart and the Alström Eye.
- Strengthen Governance
- Grow and develop the Breaking Down Barriers project to reach more organisations and develop good practice models to reach excluded communities.
- Continue to develop a personalised approach for individuals and Families affected by Alström Syndrome.

Financial Review

The total surplus for the year amounted to £9,778 compared to a deficit of £46,425 last year.

Reserves Policy and Going Concern

The trustees review the level of reserves on a regular basis to ensure that the appropriate levels are maintained considering the main risks to the organisation and future developments. The following designated reserves are held at the year-end:

Financial Assistance Grant Fund £7,145 - Amount set aside to provide financial support to Alström patients and their families based upon an assessment of need.

Adult Empowerment Grant Fund £12,825 - Amount set aside to enable and empower adults with Alström to be used for a variety of activities that improve their ability to self-advocate, to meet up with other adults and try something new. Funds may also be used to improve communication and confidence for adults with Alström.

The remaining reserves of £85,093 are held in the General Fund. The trustees feel that the level of free reserves are justified.

The trustees hold restricted reserves of £70,865

The trustees have reviewed the circumstances of the Charity and consider that adequate resources continue to be available to fund its activities for the foreseeable future. The trustees are of the view that the charity is a going concern.

Management of Risk

The Trustees have identified that the main risks to the Charity are:

- The NHS England clinic contract
 The loss of key personnel
- 3. Failing to secure sufficient funds

The Trustees monitor the risks with contact and communication with the managers.

1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a private company limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales and a registered charity in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is 4 St Kitts Close, Torquay, TQ2 7GD, Devon.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Companies Act 2006.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis.

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Disclosure exemptions

Under Charities SORP (FRS 102) the Charity is classed as a small charity and has therefore taken the exemption from the requirement to prepare a cashflow statement.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular future project or commitment.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

3. Accounting policies (continued)

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, noncharitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking
 activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those
 support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable
 activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Computer equipment - 25% straight line

Financial instruments

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or payable including any related transaction costs, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where it is recognised at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted.

Debt instruments are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

Defined contribution plans

Contributions to defined contribution plans are recognised as an expense in the period in which the related service is provided. Prepaid contributions are recognised as an asset to the extent that the prepayment will lead to a reduction in future payments or a cash refund.

When contributions are not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the end of the reporting date in which the employees render the related service, the liability is measured on a discounted present value basis. The unwinding of the discount is recognised as an expense in the period in which it arises.

4. Limited by guarantee

The Company is limited by guarantee, having no share capital. It is a registered charity. Under the provisions of Section 30 of the Companies Act 2006, the company is entitled to omit the word "Limited" from its name. In the event of the company being wound up, the liability of each member is limited to £10.
